'Me and Wood Street'


In each edition we want to introduce you to a member of the team and tell you a little more about them.

I was first referred to Wood Street Mission a few years ago for help with the cost of school uniforms. I was on a low income due to being a full time carer to my eldest son, who has educational learning difficulties. The referral led me to receiving help towards Christmas, Easter and everyday basics.

A few months ago a job vacancy came up and I applied. After the interview and careful consideration by the Wood Street team, to my amazement I was offered the position of Project Worker.

I couldn't be more grateful and appreciate all the help and support that the Wood Street team have given me. I love my role and enjoy coming to work every morning. I now get to help and support families the way I was helped.



Collaborating with The Clink

This year we've been incredibly proud to work with The Clink charity. By training prisoners from HMP Styal in their restaurants, they're reducing reoffending rates and helping to find them jobs in the hospitality industry.

This year they've made such a difference to the quality of the food being offered at our Book Clubs and Summer event with fabulous

healthy lunches for our families, including at one

If you follow us on social media you're probably used to seeing us talk about our 'Family Basics' project. This is how we describe what used to be known as the Community Shop. As no money ever changes hands, we thought the change of name better suited the service. Our Family Basics provides support to families who are struggling and just need a little extra help with the day to day essentials.

These include:

- · Children's Clothing
- Bedding and Towels
- Tovs
- Baby Equipment
- Toiletries

Over the summer period alone we have helped over 1,000 families with this project and the need for more items continues to grow.

Families can, by appointment, visit our Family Basics room at Wood Street in Manchester City Centre, to pick the items they most need.



A Lasting Legacy

Throughout our history gifts left to us in Wills have played a vital part in support of our work. In the days when we gave room and board to children with nowhere else to go, and provided children from the city with their first seaside holiday, legacies provided essential funding to pay for cots and beds for the children to sleep in. Plaques commemorating this generosity are still on display in our building.

More recently, through a gift made in memory, we have been able to set up the Primrose Fund. The Fund will allow us to provide families with baby equipment that is required urgently but we just don't have in stock. A wonderful lasting legacy that will continue to help families for years to come.

Our SmartStart project was able to help 3,199 children this year. During the Summer, families were able to order new non-branded school uniform items that their children needed, in time for back to school in September. For the rest of the year, we aim to provide, where possible, new and good quality used donations of uniform and kit through our Family Basics project.

Many families have to cut back on day to day basics or get into debt to be able to afford the costs of school essentials to send their children back to school. SmartStart aims to help alleviate this pressure on families and enable children from low income families to fit in and achieve at school.

We have maintained our successful partnership with David Luke Uniform Suppliers who work tirelessly to fulfil our orders and provide a first-class service.
